
You see, prestige and glory – even Olympic prestige and glory – doesn’t last. Perhaps that is why God encourages us to aim

The Apostle Paul ministered in Greece during the time of the original Olympics. He wrote to the Church in Corinth: “Everyone who competes in the games, does so to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever” (1 Cor 9:25). In
